Extract: Thomas Jefferson's Translation of Destutt de Tracy's Commentary on Book 2 of Montesquieu's Esprit des Lois, [ca. 12 August 1810]

"The common division of governments into republican, monarchical & despotic, appears to me essentially bad.

The word <u>republican</u> is a very vague term, under which is comprehended a multitude of governments, very different from one another, from the peaceable democracy of Schwitz & the turbulent one of Athens, to the concentrated aristocracy of Berne, & the gloomy oligarchy of Venice. this characteristic of <u>republican</u> moreover is not proper to be placed in opposition with that of <u>monarchical</u>.for the United Netherlands, and the United States of America have a single head, and are considered as republics, and we have been always doubtful whether we should say, the kingdom, or the republic of Poland."
